Fall is Time for Clam Bakes!



Our second ski trip for 2025 is to Steamboat! If you've not been there recently, you are in for a treat. Last season they added 650 acers of skiing from the previously inaccessible Mahogany Ridge area. It boasts single and double black diamonds ski trails. Something for our most adventurous skiers. Several lifts and gondolas have been added in recent years, as well. Plans are in the works to

create a gondola system much like what we saw at Telluride. To check out their timeline of recent improvements click here. BTW... Steamboat has 2,965 skiable acres!

Did you know that according to Google that "The summit of Steamboat Mountain in Steamboat Springs, Colorado is 10,568 feet (3,221 meters) high. The base elevation of the ski

resort is 6,900 feet (2,103 meters). Steamboat Mountain has 169 named trails, eighteen lifts, and over 4.6 square miles of skiable terrain. The trail system is divided into 14% beginner, 42% intermediate, and 44% advanced trails. The longest run is over three miles long." Steamboat covers six mountains including Mount Werner, Sunshine Peak, Storm Peak, Thunderhead Peak, Mahogany Ridge, and Christie Peak.

Ski News from around the World



A Warmer World Creates an Uncertain Future for European and American Skiing

An article about the closure of Alpe du Grand Serre, an 85-year-old resort, and one of the largest ski area in Europe caught my attention. The Ski area was not opening this season. Its closure underscores the changes we are about to encounter. The French Alps resort operated only four weeks last season! Attempts were made to make it a year-round resort, but funds were simply not there. So, the decision to not open this year was made with only two months left before opening day. The ski area's closure was devastating to the locals. Skiing in the mountains is the life blood for many businesses. The economic impact is heartbreaking for the workers and their families. The town only has a population of five hundred. And the ski area alone employed two hundred people. Can these people reinvent themselves or do they have to move away. And this beautiful place falls into ruin? Two other resorts in the French Alps have already closed. It is fair to say that financial problems and mismanagement may have contributed to their closures as well as climate change. The bottom line is they are gone.

I began to think about skiing in America. I remembered when many of us began to ski in the 1970's that the ski season began in early December, and we skied well into March or even early April. Today, we begin skiing in early January. Ski seasons are shorter here, too.

Many ski areas rely heavily on snowmaking. According to USDA today 's article, "Large French Alpine ski resort to close in face of shrinking snow season," Total snowfall has decreased in many parts of the U.S. since widespread observations became available in 1930, with 57% of stations showing a decline, according to the Environmental Protection Agency. Among all of the stations, the average change is a decrease of 0.19% per

year. That means that our ski season has shortened on average of two weeks since 1970. Interestingly, the ski season increased in the 1980's, 1990's and 2000's. Why, you ask, snowmaking increased significantly in those years. You can even see snowmaking high up in the mountains at some areas like Snowmass, or Powder Mountain, just to name two. However, since the 2010's even with snowmaking ski seasons have shortened seasons because the wintertime temperatures are so close to the freezing point. Snow making can begin at 27.5° F with low humidity. I've read the A-Basin and

other Colorado areas are making snow to build a base. Early snow just isn't coming. It is a real challenge for the groomers and snowmakers.

Will skiing look the same in twenty years? Probably not. Many ski areas have turned to summertime activities like mountain bike trails, mountain coasters, and golf courses to make ends meet. Some indoor ski places have recently opened in the U.S. and around the world. Skiing today is an 85-billion-dollar industry. For you and me the experience on a mountain top is priceless! 


